There is an entire workshop on Photoshop software (in more depth) and editing your photos scheduled for August 19th so mark your calendars and stay tuned for more information. Trip Report - Ambergris Caye, Belize

Ambergris Caye is a quiet little island in the northern part of Belize, near the border of Mexico. I was interested in finding a new location for a group trip but wanted to see the resorts before recommending one to other divers so Ann Marie and I took a trip there last October.

We arrived in Belize City on the afternoon flight with Taca. After clearing customs and immigration, which was quite painless, we went to the domestic terminal to catch the short flight to San Pedro. Taking off in the late afternoon, the 15 minute sunset ride made us feel like we were a million miles from the modern world.

While on Ambergris we stayed in 3 hotels; the Blue Tang, Journey's End and our favorite, El Pescador. We arrived at El Pescador by water taxi on Wednesday and were met on the dock by Penne and Bob. Penne helps manage the resort and Bob runs the fishing operation.

After a welcome drink we were shown to our villa. The villas are beautiful 3 bedroom houses with a huge common area equipped with a full kitchen, comfortable living room and a second floor deck which looks out over the Caribbean and a private salt water swimming pool.

It was nice to have a kitchen in the villa but with quality of the food, we did not really need it. The evening routine starts every day at 3PM with the opening of the bar. Divers and fisherman alike show up as they finish the day's activities to swap lies about the size of the fish. Dinner is served at 6:30PM in the open air. The tables are set up banquet style so everyone has the opportunity to socialize with other guests. It's a great way to meet new friends.

I was up early the next morning, excited about the day's dives. I met Alanzo Flota, PADI instructor, head of the Dive operation and co-owner of the resort. He was in the pool with a student taking a refresher class and I could tell by the way he was working with his student that this was going to be a great day.

Once they finished in the pool, we loaded up the gear and headed for the reefs. Alonzo specializes in small groups to make your dive more intimate. Safety and personal attention ensure a dramatic dive that you'll remember for a lifetime. Alonzo works with groups of 2 to 7 divers to provide the attention and safety so tension will be replaced with relaxation. Smooth water and dive sights no more than 10 minutes from the dock result in dive trip, Belize has a different approach. You will go on

an interesting approach to diving. While most of us are used to being on the water for 6 to 8 hours for a 3 tank dive trip, Belize has a different approach. You will go on three 1 tank dive trips and take your surface interval on the beach back at the resort. This is an ideal situation for divers who are traveling with non-divers. Instead of being gone all day, you'll be gone for an hour and then have lunch with your companion.

On these trips we had 4 divers and visited 2 great sights, Caye Canyon and Mexico Rock. Belize is protected by a barrier reef which is about ¼ mile offshore. There are several natural cuts through the reef which provide passage for the dive boats. The guide will pick his favorite spot and tie off to a mooring buoy. From the barrier reef, which runs north south, there are a series of coral formations which push out to the west like fingers. The tops are as shallow as 30' going as deep as 100'.

Alanzo is a great guide and lead the group through the coral formations spotting sea life before any of the divers knew they were there. He briefed us on his hand signals before hand so when we heard him rap on is tank and saw his signals we knew exactly what to look for. Sea turtles were the highlights but we saw plenty of mature blue tang, barracuda, colorful parrot fish and the largest puffer I have ever seen.

Since the boats are typically 20' which carry 7 to 10 divers, the entry is a back roll and the exit involves the removal of you gear in the water and passing it up to the deck hand. This was new to me since the majority of my boat diving has been large operation in Panama City, Florida. It take a little more to do but well worth it to dive with a group of 4 instead of a group as large as 30 on a single wreck. I felt like I had the Caribbean to myself.

Since Ann Marie is not a diver we decided to go on a snorkel trip the next day. On the trip we stopped at 2 sites, Hol Chan and Shark/Ray Alley. Hol Chan is Spanish for little pass and it is a long, narrow pass through the barrier reef. It makes for a great snorkel trip since you can swim alone one side of the pass and back along the other. We also swam over the top of the reef to see what life was there. We saw all the reef fish you would see diving along with a few extras. We spotted a green moray out in the open and several sea turtles.

Shark/Ray alley was another exciting stop. It is a spot inside the reef where the boat operators attract nurse sharks and sting rays by chumming the water. Once the water is filled with the sharks and rays we all jump in the water to swim among them. The guide even took one of the sharks by the dorsal fin, reached under his belly and flipped it over for the guests to pet. I must admit, that

level of interaction made me a little nervous but after a few minutes we became very comfortable with the sharks swimming around.

The next day was our last before flying home so there was no more diving. Ann Marie and I took 2 bicycles and road into town. After a short ride along a cart path which passes for a road and a ride on a hand pulled ferry (next time we will take the water ferry) we did lots of shopping along Barrier Reef Drive and Pescador Drive. The shops have everything you could ask for from woods carving, paintings and jewelry made by local artisans to beautiful scarves and clothing. If you are interested you can even buy larger wooden products such as deck chairs and decorative statues. The shops know just how much you can take home on the plane and they will ship items back to the US.

While El Pescador was the highlight of the trip for diving and lodging, there was one other experience which I must talk about. The Rendezvous Restaurant & Winery is was a surprise to both Ann Marie and I and is Ambergris Caye's latest fine dining restaurant specializing in authentic Thai & French Fusion Cuisine. With only 24 seats and an open style kitchen this intimate setting is a one of a kind on Ambergris Caye. Rendezvous Restaurant and Winery produces their own brand of wines called "Rendezvous Estates©" made right on the property. With five favorites you are sure to find one you'll enjoy. Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot are the most popular in the reds and you will have a hard time deciding if you prefer the Pinot Chardonnay or the Trebiano. Glenn and Colleen have spent years making wine and brought their art to San Pedro.

After a marvelous week of diving, snorkeling, shopping and fine dining, Ann Marie and I made our farewells on the dock and took the water taxi back to San Pedro. We were back in Houston in no time and all with all the great memories and excited about bringing a group back to enjoy this marvelous spot.

President Bush extends protection for waters off Hawaii

WASHINGTON (AP) -- President Bush created a vast new marine sanctuary on Thursday, extending stronger federal protections to the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands and the surrounding waters with their endangered monk seals, nesting green sea turtles and other rare species.

miles wide in the Pacific Ocean. It's home to more than 7,000 species, at least a fourth of them found nowhere else.

"To put this area in context, this national monument is more than 100 times larger than Yosemite National Park," Bush said. "It's larger than 46 of our 50 states, and more than seven times larger than all our national marine sanctuaries combined. This is a big deal."

Bush announced his creation of the nation's 75th national monument at a White House ceremony. The decision immediately sets aside 140,000 square miles of largely uninhabited islands, atolls, coral reef colonies and underwater peaks known as seamounts to be managed by federal and state agencies.

In introducing the president, first lady Laura Bush quoted Mark Twain, who once described Hawaii as "the loveliest fleet of islands that lies anchored in any ocean."

Conrad C. Lautenbacher, head of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, which will manage nearly all of it, said the new protected area would dwarf all others.

"It's the single-largest act of ocean conservation in history. It's a large milestone," Lautenbacher said. "It is a place to maintain biodiversity and to maintain basically the nurseries of the Pacific. It spawns a lot of the life that permeates the middle of the Pacific Ocean."

It is only the second time that Bush has invoked the 1906 National Antiquities Act, which gives the president authority to create national monuments to preserve the nation's ancient cultural sites and unusual geological features. The law itself turned 100 this month.

The president had planned as late as Wednesday to use instead the National Marine Sanctuary Act, a law that would allow challenges from Congress and others to the decision, said a senior administration official, speaking on condition of anonymity so as not to upstage Bush.

"This means the area will get immediate protection rather than having to wait another year," the official said, adding that Bush opted at the last minute to create a national monument after realizing the process had gone on for five years and elicited thousands of comments.

With the national monument designation, the federal government can immediately begin a five-year phaseout of the eight commercial fishing permits in the area and impose strict prohibitions on any other extractive uses, the official said.

In February, Bush used the antiquities law for the first time when he declared part of the African Burial Ground in the lower Manhattan section of New York City a national monument. The site, covering less than half an acre, marks where an estimated 20,000 slaves and free blacks were buried in the 18th century

President Clinton used the act to create 19 national monuments and expand three others to set aside 5.9 million acres of land, mainly in the West, and he drew widespread criticism from conservatives.

About 132,000 square miles of the marine area that is being set aside for the national monument already is designated either a coral reef ecosystem reserve or a national wildlife refuge. By making it a national monument, the government will have greater power to protect it.

Expanding the existing reserve and refuge to a monument of 140,000 square miles will make it the largest no-take marine conservation area in the world, just ahead of the Great Barrier Reef in Australia. Midway Atoll, one of the outermost points of the new monument, will retain an emergency landing strip for commercial and military trans-Pacific flights.

NOAA will develop regulations for managing all of the monument except for two national wildlife refuges within it that will still be overseen by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Last month, state and federal officials signed an agreement to manage the pristine islands jointly.

Administration officials say their intent is to preserve zoned access for native Hawaiian activities, educational and scientific expeditions. Recreational and tourist visits that are no more harmful than scuba diving or photography also will be allowed. Permits, however, will be required for all activities.

Joshua Reichert, who heads the private Pew Charitable Trusts' environment program which pushed for the sanctuary for eight years, said the region contains almost 70 percent of the tropical shallow water coral reefs in the United States.

"When you add it all up, it's a world-class ecological jewel," he said. "From both a national and global perspective, this really is a landmark conservation event."

A lobster that already looks like it's been cooked on one side won't suffer the real thing, thanks to a sharp-eyed fisherman.

The oddly coloured lobster "looks curious ... It was almost just the same as [being] boiled on one side," said Kirk Tulk, who caught the lobster in one of his pots outside his home in Aspen Cove, in Hamilton Sound on Newfoundland's northeast coast.

The lower right part of the lobster's body is bright orange, as is its upper claw. Tulk said he has been told that the unusual colouring may be due to a protein deficiency in the lobster's body.

Tulk is donating the lobster to the marine interpretation centre in Terra Nova National Park, which includes observation tanks that can be viewed by the public.

The lobster will also be examined by scientists from the federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans.
