





## The 'Titanic' and 'Avatar' director went solo on the historic

The 'Titanic' and 'Avatar' director went solo on the historic, dangerous journey

The Deepsea Challenger submersible begins its first 2.5-mile (4-km) test dive off the coast of Papua New Guinea. The sub is the centerpiece of Deepsea Challenge, a joint scientific project by explorer and filmmaker James Cameron, the National Geographic Society and Rolex to conduct deep-ocean research. snbc.com staff and

<u>HONOLULU</u> — Director James Cameron reached the Earth's deepest point and returned, in a seven-hour solo journey to explore a place only two men have gone before.

"Just arrived at the ocean's deepest pt. Hitting bottom never felt so good. Can't wait to share what I'm seeing w/ you," tweeted the director of "Titanic" and "Avatar," from his state-of-the-art diving vessel Deepsea Challenger, when he reached his target.

Cameron used a specially designed submarine to descend nearly seven miles to the bottom of the Mariana Trench, an area 200 miles southwest of the Pacific island of Guam.

He began the dive Monday at approximately 5:15 a.m. local time (early Sunday afternoon on the U.S. East Coast), according Stephanie Montgomery of the National Geographic Society, where Cameron is an explorer-in-residence. National Geographic set up a website documenting the dive challenge.

"RELEASE, RELEASE!" were the last words Cameron uttered before beginning the dive, according to a Twitter post from the expedition.

Cameron touched the bottom after a 2-hour-and-36-minute descent, then studied the ocean floor for several hours before making his 70-minute ascent back to the surface, according to National Geographic's own report.

Billionaire Paul Allen had been following the dive action from a helicopter while monitoring Cameron's communications via special under water radio <u>technology</u>. Allen kept followers updated via <u>his Twitter feed</u>. "Sub now deeper than everest at 32160 speed 2.0 knots not long to seabead now,"



wrote Allen, shortly before Cameron touched the bottom.

As Cameron's Deepsea Challenger emerged, at 12 noon local time (10 p.m. Eastern Time), Allen wrote "#deepseachallenge has surfaced, now for recovery..." A short while later, he reported, "Saw James Cameron Emerge from #Deepseachallenge sub and wave back at us as we flew over in the Octopus Helo...safe and sound!"

Allen posted several pictures of the capsule in the water, and then one showing the capsule being hauled onto its support ship. The scale of the trench is hard to grasp — it's 120 times larger than the Grand Canyon and more than a mile deeper than Mount Everest is tall (hence Allen's "Everest" remark). Once Cameron reached the bottom aboard his 12-ton, lime-green sub, he planned to collect samples for biologists and geologists to study.

There's considerable wiggle room built in, however, as the submarine Cameron helped design has the capability to support life for a 56-hour dive. The first and only time anyone dove to these depths was in 1960. Swiss engineer Jacques Piccard and U.S. Navy Capt. Don Walsh took nearly five hours to reach the bottom and stayed just 20 minutes. They didn't have much to report on what they saw there, however, because their submarine kicked up so much sand from the ocean floor they couldn't see much.

One of the risks of a dive so deep is extreme water pressure. At 6.8 miles below the surface, the pressure is the equivalent of three SUVs sitting on your toe.

James Cameron describes his exploration while standing in front of the Deepsea Challenger vessel. Cameron told The Associated Press in an <u>interview</u> after a 5.1 miledeep practice run near Papua New



Guinea earlier this month that the pressure "is in the back of your mind." The submarine would implode in an instant if it leaked, he said. But while he was a little apprehensive beforehand, he wasn't scared or nervous while underwater. "When you are actually on the dive you have to trust the engineering was done right," he said. The latest dive site, which is at the deepest point in the Mariana Trench, is named Challenger Deep after the British naval vessel HMS Challenger that used sound to first measure its depth.

The film director has been an oceanography enthusiast since childhood and has made 72 deep-sea submersible dives. Thirty-three of those dives have been to the wreckage of the Titanic, the subject of his 1997 hit film.

# World's Best Wrecks

#### **BVI**

Wreck diving in the British Virgin Islands is defined by a single wreck, the Royal Mail Steamer (RMS) Rhone, by far the islands' most popular site and one of the most famous wrecks in the world, immortalized by the 1977 movie The Deep. While you're not likely to encounter a wet-T-shirt-clad Jacqueline Bisset on the scattered remains of the 310-foot steamer, you will find one of the most gorgeous sponge- and coral-encrusted wrecks around. Split into three major sections ranging in depth from 20 to 80 feet, you'll need at least two tanks to soak in the best of the best. We know you'll be star-struck, but don't overlook the BVIs' other great wrecks, including the Chikuzen, a 246-foot refrigerator vessel that sits on the sandy plateau between Tortola and Anegada. It was intentionally set ablaze off St. Maarten in the early '80s and drifted almost 100 miles-still on fire-until it sank in 80 feet of water. It's had more than 25 years to cool down, but it's red hot with marine life-including schools of jacks, grouper, barracuda and sharks-since it's pretty much the only underwater structure for miles and miles.

#### California

The sinking of the 366-foot Canadian destroyer HMCS Yukon to create an artificial reef in 2000-the West Coast's biggest-may have shined new light on the Golden State's wreck offerings, but local divers have been enjoying dozens of submerged boats for decades. Not too far from the Yukon is the S-37, a 219-foot steel submarine that saw some action in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Her infamously cramped quarters and leaking engine made her despised by her crew. She was ultimately depth-charged by her foes and, as a final insult, used for aerial target practice in 1945, sinking in 30 feet of water off Imperial Beach. The 306-foot destroyer escort John C. Butler sits off San Clemente Island in 60 to 80 feet of water, another war veteran that fought in famed battles including those in Palau, Peleliu, Leyte Gulf, Iwo Jima and Okinawa. Another interesting dive is the 100-foot El Rey, which harvested kelp off Southern California and logged more than 800,000 miles. Near Lompoc, in what is generally considered to be the worst peacetime disaster in U.S. Naval history, seven destroyers wrecked on the rocky reefs at Point Pedernales. The Delphy, Chauncey II, Fuller, Woodbury III, S.P. Lee, Nicholas and the Young are all 314-foot steel destroyers lying in depths above 40 feet with visibility ranging from nil to 50 feet.

### 2012 TGCC COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

The Texas Gulf Coast Council of Diving Clubs (TGCC) may award three Michael Szewczyk College scholarships (1 @ \$1,000 and 2 @ \$500) during 2012. Named in memory of TGCC's long time supporter, Michael Szewczyk, this award's purpose is to support the members who support the dive clubs in the Texas Gulf Coast area. The award will be paid by TGCC directly to the college towards tuition.

#### **Eligibility Rules:**

- 1. Scholarship applicant must be a college undergraduate or graduate student attending college in 2012, or a high school senior that has been or will be accepted to college in 2012.
- 2. The applicant, the parent(s) (biological or through formal adoption), or the grandparent(s) of the applicant, must be an individual member of TGCC or a member of a TGCC member club with dues current in 2012.
- 3. Application (see other side) must be received by the TGCC Donations Committee prior to **June 30, 2012. TGCC will review** all **completed applications on July 8, 2012.**
- 4. Applicant shall have the high school/college furnish a transcript of grades, courses and class standing.

#### **Scholarship General Guidelines:**

- 1. Scholarship decisions of TGCC are final.
- 2. Scholarship winner is expected to keep TGCC abreast with his/her progress in college.
- 3. TGCC reserves the right to not award a prize depending upon the number of entries and qualifications of the applicants.
- 4. A personal interview with members of the TGCC Scholar ship Committee may be required prior to awarding this scholarship.
- 5. Confirmation may be by e-mail. Make sure phone and e-mail data provided is current.
- 6. TGCC is offering this scholarship as a reward to TGCC members, TGCC member and associate clubs or the children of these members to thank them for supporting TGCC's efforts in promoting safe sport diving. The committee will take into consideration the applicant or applicant's parents involvement in TGCC and member clubs and/or the diving community in general throughout the year.
